

Superintendents dealing with extreme conditions again this year

Persistent Heat, Drought and Flooding Strain Golf **Courses Nationally**

Extended periods of excessive heat, widespread moderate to severe drought, and pockets of flooding have beset golf courses for the second consecutive year, putting a strain on revenues, golfers and the professionals who manage the game's playing fields - golf course superintendents.

"We saw widespread turf loss last year, and the feedback from our members is that this year has the potential to be as severe," Golf Course Superintendents Association of America President Bob Randquist, certified golf course superintendent at Boca Rio Golf Course in Boca Raton, Fla., said.

Researchers, university extension agents and golf course superintendents agreed that the conditions last summer were the worst in decades in terms of the geographic scope, Randquist said. The impact of this year's weather – although not as widespread – will not be determined for a few weeks, but he indicated superintendents are pulling out all the stops to counter the wrath of Mother Nature.

Superintendents have implemented a variety of management practices such as reducing green speeds by raising cutting heights and rolling less frequently; less mowing frequency; restricting cart traffic; increased hand watering; reducing/postponing verticutting and topdressing activities; if aerifying, doing so with small tines; and reducing of fertilization programs.

"The simple fact is the cool-season turfgrasses such as bentgrass, fescue, bluegrass, annual bluegrass (Poa annua) and others are stressed with sustained high temperatures and humidity," Randquist said. "Golf courses in many parts of the country experience this every year, however what made the situation so dire last year and now have been the high levels of extended heat and humidity, and the sizeable part of the country affected.

"Certainly homeowners, athletic fields and businesses suffer turfgrass damage brought on by these kinds of conditions. What makes it more difficult for golf facilities are the mowing heights are much lower and traffic is much heavier. That just adds to the stress on the turfgrass."

Also unknown is what the final impact of flooding will be. Some courses were under water for extended periods of time so the turf started the season already in a compromised position.

Randquist also cautioned golfers from thinking that water, whether from rain or irrigation, is the answer to the ills. There is a difference between heat stress and drought stress. Adequate irrigation will alleviate drought stress. Adequate irrigation will not alleviate heat stress. It is not only possible, but likely, for a turfgrass plant to be adequately watered and still suffer from heat stress under extended periods of high temperatures.

Randquist urged golfers and leaders at golf facilities not to panic. Every golf course is unique and thus reacts to the weather extremes differently. Variations in soil conditions, air movement, shade, water quality and availability, and budget make course comparisons a dangerous proposition.

"We know the weather conditions will become more agreeable," Randquist said. "What is important right now is to manage the golf course in a manner so that turf can be kept alive until that point. Pushing turf too hard might result in longer term damage."

The Mother of Necessity is Invention

Hodge Park Golf Course, Kansas City, MO. If you've played here recently you may have noticed a tee marker or two moved forward. This is because several of the course's existing Poa, Rye grass fairways are now being stripped in with zoysiagrass. Due to the constant rising costs associated with water and fungicide applications this new method of stripping in zoysia has been the start of a recent trend among several superintendents throughout the Midwest.

Zoysiagrass has several benefits; many golfers love its crisp tight lies and the way the ball seems to almost stand on top of the grass. Now in recent years zoysiagrass has begun to turn a favored eye to superintendents as they continue to search for new and innovative ways to maintain a high level of play on a demanding budget.

At Hodge Park Golf Course they have begun to spend the initial start up costs to eventually strip in all eighteen fairways over the course of the next three years. This will ensure lower costs in the future associated with less fertilizer, better Poa annua control, less water and heat distress, and less frequent mowing.

To help the crew of Hodge Park



along with the process they custom built two easy attachments for a uniloader and a tractor. Pictured bottom left is the attachment for the uniloader that is used in prepping the area by cutting two 7' strips 18" apart. These Poa, Blue and Rye grass strips are then hauled off and replaced with zoysiagrass strips Continued on next page

of the same size. On the right is the attachment for the tractor that helps the large bails of sod roll out smoothly. A crew of about 6-7 guys then go back and lay the strips into the gaps.

A full semi load of 30 bails will cover approximately 30,000 square feet and can typically be laid



out over the course of 5-6 hours. Prepping the area will take about 3-4 hours allowing the entire process to be completed in a day or two. This allows for very

little interruption in golf course revenues to occur and the course can remain open the entire time with minimal interruption.

Once the zoysiagrass strips are in place the crew will take time to roll and water the new sod consistently for the next several weeks monitoring it for healthy growth. Hodge Park hopes to see to see 70-80% coverage by the end of the third season in

all the fairways it sods with zoysiagrass this year. A moderate nitrogen fertilization is recommended 6-7 days after the new sod has been laid.



While some golf courses that

make this transition choose to hire an outside contractor to do the project the crew at Hodge Park Golf Course was able to do a great deal of the project in house. They used there own crew to lay the sod, built the two attachment pieces for the uniloader and tractor out of metal they had around the shop and used the discarded Poa, Rye sod strips they uprooted for top soil and other needed areas around the course.

Eligibility and Qualifications

Assistant Superintendent of the Year

This award will be presented annually to the assistant who has demonstrated dedication and excellence at their job over the past year.

The guidelines are as follows:

- 1. Must be a member of the Heart of America.
- 2. Must be an assistant that represents their profession to the highest degree.
- 3. Must be at their present course for no less than two seasons.
- 4. This award shall be governed by the assistant's achievements in any of the following.
 - Competency in agronomic skills
 - Ability to efficiently run the daily operations of the course
 - Effectively running course projects
 - Assisting in the preparation of their course for regional or national events
 - Involvement with local, regional, or national turf related associations
 - Strong involvement in course renovations and new course construction
 - Goal oriented and striving to become a superintendent
 - Exceptional contributions to this association through involvement
- 5. These accomplishments must have occurred in the current year.

Superintendent of the Year

This award, established in 1970, has been presented annually to the golf course superintendent who has demonstrated dedication and outstanding service to his or her profession.

The guidelines are as follows:

- 1. Must be a "Class A or Superintendent Member" in good standing.
- 2. Must be a superintendent that represents the organization and himself to the highest degree.
- 3. This award shall be governed by the superintendents achievements in either:
 - Excellence in golf course management
 - Preparation of his or her course for regional or national golf tournaments
 - Achievements for renovation or new golf course construction
 - Involvement with local, regional, or national turf related associations
 - Exceptional contributions to this association through involvement
- 4. These accomplishments must have occurred in the current year.

Chester H. Mendenhall Award

This award has been established to honor an individual who has devoted extensive time and effort to the promotion of golf, the art of greenskeeping and other related fields. Begun in 1983, this award is named after a golf course superintendent who dedicated his life to his profession.

The guidelines are as follows:

- 1. Must be a HAGCSA member in good standing.
- 2. Must be an individual that represents the organization and him or herself to the highest degree.
- 3. This award shall be governed by the individual's achievements over an extended period of time:
 - Outstanding service to this organization
 - Involvement with local, regional, or national turf related organizations
 - Continued support and service to the golf industry or his/her community
