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# PRESIDENT'S Message By: Scott Johnson, CGCS



As summer slips over the horizon a little quicker with each passing day, our focus switches from maintain and endure to recovery and prepare. September requires a juggling act due to the co-existence of a busy golf calendar and the need to perform restorative cultural practices like green's aerification and spot seeding roughs. In another thirty days, we should be able to exhale pain free and let our guard down just a little. In anticipation of a busy month on our courses, September is free of any organized chapter activities.


For the last several years, the Board has reviewed the need for a membership dues increase. The directors have focused on understanding where our money is being spent and what benefits or services does the membership receive. Basically, our monthly educational and golf meetings break even. Our administrative/management expenses, public relations effort, web site, holiday party and hospitality event at the GIS have costs that are paid for in part with our three main revenue streams: membership dues, advertising and the Common Ground Conference. Each committee on the board has carefully examined their activities while pursuing all revenue opportunities. At the July board meeting, the board determined that a dues increase was necessary and we voted in favor of a \$30 dues increase for Superintendents and Affiliates along with a \$20 increase for class C memberships effective January 2010. In order to be a little more proactive, the board established a policy to review the need for membership dues increases every odd year in

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#### **TOURNAMENT COMMITTEE REPORT**



**Old Kinderhook Superintendent Profile:** Tom Addington, CGCS, holds a BS degree in Turfgrass Management and Landscape Design from Kansas State University, as well as a Penn State Turf Degree. He served as assistant superintendent at Brookridge in 1987, and at Hallbrook from 1998-1990. He was superintendent at The Pinnacle from 1990-1996, and is now with The Club at Old Kinderhook.

**Course History - Lake Valley Golf Club:** Lake Valley is a semi-private, 18 hole championship golf course located near Camdenton, Mo. in the beautiful Lake of the Ozarks region. Designed in 1967 by Floyd Farley, the golf course offers a unique combination of six par threes, six par fours, and six par fives with a cumulative par of 36-36-72. Lake Valley features zoysia tees, lush Bermuda fairways and bent grass greens.

**Course History** - **Old Kinderhook:** The Club at Old Kinderhook opened in May 1999, and is a Tom Weiskoph design.

**Lake Valley Assistant Superintendent Profile:** Roger Jones has over 18 years of golf course maintenance experience, five of which he was the superintendent at Lebanon Country Club in Lebanon, Mo. Roger has completed several college courses and is in pursuit of his B.S. degree.

**Old Kinderhook Assistant Superintendent Profile**: Derek Wilkerson has a two-year degree from the Mundus Institute. Before joining the crew at Old Kinderhook, he worked for Alvamar and TPC of Scottsdale.

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### THE ZAC LIVINGSTON STORY

or 39 years the Everett Vinzant/John Cosnotti Memorial Junior Golf Tournament has been one of the largest junior golf tournaments in the entire Midwest. Hosted at Overland Park Golf Club, this year's tournament took place on August 3rd, 4th and 5th, 2009. Over 500 junior golfers participated in this annual event. Doug Melchior, Golf Course Superintendent at the Overland Park course, believes that this tournament and the junior golf leagues associated with it, play a vital role in the development of future golfing generations, "Today's junior player is tomorrow's Patron."

Since 2006, the Overland Park Golf Course has been a programming site for The First Tee of Greater Kansas City. Tim Eleeson, Director of Golf at the course and his staff, use our Par 3 golf course and nine holes of the regulation course as a teaching facility for golfing juniors age 6 and older. Monday through Wednesday, three daily sessions are conducted, two on the Par 3 and one on the North. These young golfers are exposed to the nine core values of The First Tee, courtesy, respect, judgment, integrity, honesty, perseverance, sportsmanship, confidence and responsibility as well as golf etiquette, golf instruction and camaraderie.

One example we witnessed at the awards ceremony was when we awarded the trophies. All the 9 year old boys in one of the divisions, removed their hats as they shook the presenter's hand and accepted their trophies. This is one of the first lessons that The First Tee teaches.

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

## Taking a Longview at Arbanas

Managing older greens in desperate need of rebuilding is no fun. Try as you might, keeping up with the Jones' with their new, improved bentgrass cultivars that love lower mowing heights grown on surfaces with high percolations rates and efficient irrigation can be enough to make a grown agronomist cry with envy and frustration. Many of you are living it. Many of you have been there but are now reaping the benefits of a renovation. Russell Bonneville, Superintendent at Fred Arbanas GC, knows the agony of the former and the ecstasy of the later. It was a long time com-

With the grand reopening of Fred Arbanas GC just a few months old, Bonneville is still in the process of tweaking things to get them just right. But one thing is for certain, the A-4 greens at Fred Arbanas are pure, and for the first time in many years, a typical Kansas City summer is not going to wreck that!

#### Retrospective

of their lives. They became interested because of the influence of their uncle and benefactor, Leon Andrews, the wily old golf pro who plied his trade for many years at Indian Hills and Brookridge. Leon also went on to design a few area courses like Rabbit Creek in Louisburg and the 2nd nine holes at Osawatomie GC.

While at Brookridge in 1969, Uncle Leon enticed Russell to go to work for Paul Mitchell. He was 14 years old at the time. That small shove was all it took. Russell was hooked. After graduating high school in 1974, he got fortunate and landed a position at Alvamar, under the tutelage of Mel Anderson. "If I could call one person my mentor, it would be Mel," states Bonneville. "He was such an innovator, working toward development of the triplex greens mower. He also was a great teacher. And of course, he was one, if not the very first, to implement zoysia this far north."

Russell relates a story that speaks to Mel's humor and personality, "While sitting in Mel's office one day with his son, Gary, Mel was adamant about keeping golfers away from a freshly redone area out on hole #6 on Hidden Valley (the original 9 holes of the private side at Alvamar). 'I don't care if you have to string barbed wire!' he told us. Unbeknown to Mel, Gary must have taken him a little too literally. I thought Mel was going to have a cow when told that the barbed wire had been installed!"

In early 1977, Russell got a tip about an opening for the Superintendent at McPherson CC from his brother Randall, who had landed in the area as the head man at Hesston GC. Russell seized the opportunity and for the next 8 years he honed his skills there. By the mid-80's, Bonneville found himself back in the area, this time under Sandy Queen, CGCS at Overland Park. "I became the Superintendent of the new West Links course, and then eventually all 36 holes." Nine years later, Russell did the unexpected.

"I decided to take a year off and pursue a career in song writing!" confessed Bonneville, who has a penchant for progressive country music and a desire to write lyrics as well as music. Like many a frustrated writer (this scribe can certainly attest!), Russell found getting published an extremely difficult feat. "It didn't pan out, so I went back to work!"

Russell jumped back into the business where he had had so much success by signing on with Nels Lindgren, CGCS at Loch Lloyd CC. Just over a year later, the Arbanas job came open and Bonneville was selected to take the reins. Twelve years have passed and he still drives the train!

#### A Rebirth on the Lake

Fred Arbanas GC (formerly Longview Lake), was built by Jackson County Parks and opened for play in 1986. It boasted not only a championship 18 holes, but also a 9-hole executive course. Nestled in the heart of the old Longview Farms on the east side of Longview Lake, it has long been a favorite golf destination for south Kansas City and Lee's Summit. Its picturesque limestone clubhouse, view of the lake and the ensuing rolling valleys, as well as its generous zoysia fairways make for an enjoyable golf outing. Over the years it has matured gracefully...well, almost!

#### Arbanas Clubhouse, Original Ranch Homestead

20-year old greens rarely have redeeming qualities. Over time, percolation rates dwindle, Poa annua encroaches, and warts become apparent. Arbanas' greens were no different. It was becoming more obvious with each passing season and with every new competing course that came on line, that a greens renovation was needed if the course was going to compete for patronage.

"The biggest challenge with the old greens was trying to get reasonable ball speed to keep up with other area golf courses," admits Russell. "Need-

less to say that only led to other problems in the heat of the summer." Bonneville had sympathetic and influential allies when the subject of a greens renovation was finally breached.

Enter county legislators and frequent patrons to the course, Dan Tarwater and course namesake, Fred Arbanas. "These two individuals were instrumental in selling the notion that a greens renovation was in order. The County stepped up, and the wheels were put into motion."

Craig Schreiner, ASGCA, formerly from KC, now in Myrtle Beach, SC was awarded the redesign. He worked closely with Bonneville, insuring their insights and goals for Arbanas were reached. "Working with Craig was inspiring. He has a high energy level, positive attitude and great communication skills. He knows how to get his point across," states Bonneville. Schreiner made several site visits during the renovation, even climbing aboard Mid-America Golf and Landscape dozers to do a little shaping from time-to-time.

Schreiner had high praise for Bonneville. "Russell broke the mold of what one might expect from a municipal Superintendent. He was one of the hardest working Supers I have ever met. That grow-in was the best I have ever seen for greens that were just 8-months old at opening. He was very receptive to our methods, got things done and never missed a beat!" Craig went on to say that working with Bonneville on the West Links project many years prior to Arbanas only cemented their working relationship.

Though the emphasis of the project's scope was to the greens complexes, Russell was also able to enlarge back tees on the par 3's. "We now have enough variance to the length of these holes to force different clubs into patron's hands on each one."

After much research and touring other facilities, A-4 was the cultivar Russell chose for the new greens. He claims that the grow-in at Arbanas went relatively smoothly due to the fact that with the exception of the green surfaces, everything else was sodded. As with any well-made plan, Mother Nature put a few hitches in the giddy-up. "If you recall 2008," Russell recounts, "3 major hurricanes affected the area during construction causing long delays. We did not get the final two greens seeded until well into October." It was decided that the purchase of two geo-textile greens covers was in order to protect the late bloomers. "It made a big difference in how those two greens over-wintered," claimed Bonneville. "By late March they were in the best condition of all of them!"

Russell also fondly recalls not having to deal with golfers for 12 months. "It is the best thing that a Superintendent can experience! The very best day was the first closed day. Job assignments were simple; bring EVERYTHING in! Flags, cups, benches, trash cans, rakes, hazard stakes, everything!"

In addition to his full-time staff of nine (himself included), Russell was only allowed four seasonal employees during the renovation. "Having a veteran staff during this time cerContinued on next page

tainly helped in the success of the project," says Russell. He adds, "My Assistant, Robert Matthews and Lead Park Person, Bill Sparks have been in place at Arbanas even longer than myself. Staff members Clayton White and Olin Gaines have been on board for nine and seven years respectively." Bonneville readily admits that with such strong team members, anything is possible. "Their knowledge of the course and course history are a huge asset!"

Of course, not all goals during the renovation were attained. "We didn't accomplish all that we had hoped for," admits Russell. "It would have been nice to get a few more drainage issues in the fairways rectified. We just ran out of time." Hey, you got to save a few odds and ends to keep you busy this winter!

#### Introspective

Fred Arbanas has opened to rave reviews. Though there is no way to quantify it, Russell thinks that 95% of his patrons have looked favorably on the changes that have been made. "There are always going to be that small percentage who ask, why did you do this or why didn't you do that? Of course, they turn right around and make a tee time for the next day!"

In addition to Russell's brother, Randall, who is still a Superintendent, now residing for the last 20 years in Ft. Collins, CO, his nephew, Jason is the next generation of Bonneville' to go into the business as a Superintendent in Tuscaloosa, AL. Russell also has a son, Russell Jr. (27) and a daughter, Adley (25), whose families live here in the metro and Inman, KS. He is blessed with six grand kids, all of whom keep him busy when away from work.

"When I am away from work, I prefer to do anything *indoors!*" And, of course, there is Russell's song writing. He admits that he still dabbles in it. *Once you have the bug, there is no turning back!* He utilizes home studio software that makes his forays into music even more enjoyable. Like all of my subjects who have appeared in this section, I asked Russell to impart some advice to those of us just starting out. "Get a degree, don't plan on any time off from May through September and remember; no one ever became a millionaire working on a golf course!" At least not from our end of the golf club!

Russell Bonneville may be an obscure, wanna-be songwriter, destined to pen ballads never to be heard anywhere but from the

menu of his hard drive. But one never knows! Time is on his side. That one big hit may yet be written or discovered. But Bonneville's success as a GC Superintendent has already been assured. His volume of work has and is still being written. Jackson County not only has a classic, re-mixed *golden oldie* in Arbanas, their #1 hit truly lies with their Superintendent.




## The Archives

Editor's Note: This little gem by Chet Mendenhall was first published in June 1983.

## DO YOU REMEMBER WHEN . . .

We used Old Dobbin to pull our fairway mowers?



My first experience with horse drawn mowers, was with five units drawn with two horses. The job in the morning was to feed and groom the horses. If it had been raining and the fairways were soft, you put big leather boots on all four feet of each horse to keep from leaving hoof marks in the fairway. You filled a feed bag for each horse to take with you. At noon time you watered, and put the feed bags on the horse, before you had your lunch. It took too much time to take the horses into the barn at lunch time. At the end of the day the horses were taken back to the barn, watered, fed and bedded down for the night. You did not do all this in eight hours.

The mowers were a far cry from the mowers of today. No oil tight gear boxes, no sealed bearings. The gear cases were rather open. You had to stop every hour, get out the old oil can and oil all the moving parts. The gears were made of soft cast iron, so you spent considerable time repairing the mowers.

It took the better part of a week to cut eighteen fairways. The rough outside the fairways was cut with a cycle bar mower, cutting three or four widths of the cycle bar on each side of the fairway. The area beyond that was left until time to put up hay, then it was cut and the hay put up for feed.

## USCIS ACCEPTING NEW H-2B PETITIONS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2009

The U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) announced Aug. 6 it is reopening the FY2009 (Oct. 1, 2008-Sept. 30, 2009) H-2B petition filing period and will immediately accept petitions from employers to bring foreign workers to the U.S. to fill temporary nonagricultural jobs for which there is a shortage of available U.S. workers.

Even though the visa cap for the second half of FY2009 was met back on Jan. 7, 2009, the Department of State received fewer than expected requests for H-2B visas, and as a result, has issued only 40,640 H-2B visas for FY2009 to date. USCIS is now making 25,000 visas available.


The normal (non-premium processing) time frame for H-2B petitions is 60 days. USCIS will make visa numbers available to petitions in the order in which the petitions are filed. However, because H-2B petitions (Form I-129) for FY2009 visas must be received, evaluated, and adjudicated on or before the FY2009 deadline of Sept. 30, 2009, USCIS cannot guarantee approval of any H-2B petition on or before the Sept. 30, 2009 deadline. Employers are encouraged to file as soon as possible and to request premium processing by filing a Form I-907 and submitting the \$1000 premium processing fee, which will allow for expedited processing.



To qualify for a FY2009 H-2B cap number, employers must: submit the Form I-129 Petition for a Nonimmigrant Worker to USCIS with all required documents, including an approved Alien Employment Certification from the U.S. Department of Labor that is valid for the entire employment period stated on the petition. The petitioner must also indicate an employment start date before Oct. 1, 2009.

Petitions received on or after Oct. 1, 2009, and/ or requesting a starting date on or after Oct. 1, 2009, will be considered towards the FY2010 H-2B cap and are subject to all eligibility requirements for FY2010 H-2B filings.



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## MORE POWERFUL THAN YOU KNOW

"Writing is not a job; it's a hobby!" thundered my father when I told him my plans for college. "You need to get a profession: medicine, law, engineering or accounting."

I cheerlessly acquiesced and enrolled in a Pre-Med program, but at the end of my first year, after struggling through Chemistry, I changed my major to Philosophy. When I told Dad, he grunted, "That and a dime will get you a cup of coffee." He passed away shortly after that but his words echoed in the back of my mind for years.

After graduation I searched for a job in writing. At the same time, I wrote short stories like crazy, and sent them off to dozens of magazines. Years passed and I failed to find a job in writing, so I supported myself by waiting tables and bartending. Meanwhile, rejection letters from the magazines began piling up, and I was beginning to get discouraged.



Then one day, I met a friend for a beer in a bar near the campus of my alma mater. When I visited the restroom, some graffiti written on the wall with an arrow pointing to the toilet paper dispenser caught my eye. It read: "Bachelor of Arts Degrees – take only one, please!" Rather than laugh, I grimaced and thought, "Boy, does that sound like my Dad."

Five years had gone by, and other than a few freelance jobs writing advertising copy, I had not made a penny from writing. I was beginning to re-think my life, when I recalled the encouraging words from my ninth grade English teacher.

She had assigned my class with several essays to write. I remembered the glowing paragraphs of praise she wrote in bright red ink at the top of all my papers. There must have been a dozen of those compositions, and just recalling them gave me hope. I thought, "At least one person in the world believes in my writing."

It was just the encouragement I needed, and I doubled my efforts to find work. Soon I was getting a great deal more freelance work. Enough that I was able to quit working in restaurants. Enough to make a down payment on a house. Then whenever I needed a boost in confidence, I would think again of those dozen glowing paragraphs of praise written in bright red ink at the top of my essay papers.

Suddenly everything seemed to gel. I sold my first book; I won several very important advertising awards; and three colleges were asking me to teach a class in copywriting. I was feeling very grateful and once again thought of my ninth grade English teacher and those glowing paragraphs of praise written in bright red ink. I decided to look her up and give her a call.

When I got her on the phone my first shock was that she did not remember me. I was certain I had been one of her **Continued on next page**

favorites. My second was when she told me that she never wrote paragraphs of praise. "There were simply too many papers to grade to write more than a word or two," She said. "I would write 'Nice Work' or 'Good Job,' but never anything more."

Unconvinced, when I got off the phone, I went up to the attic and dug out the box that held my old school work (yes, it's true – I'm a total pack rat – especially when it comes to things I've written!). It took a while, but I finally found those old papers. She was right; there were no paragraphs. And, there was far less than a dozen – only two. About the only thing I remembered correctly was the bright red ink. I did, however, rate more than one or two words. On the first one she wrote, "Nicely written – well thought out." On the other, "Good Sense of Humor!"

Nine words. Nine little words that were so heartening that over the next 15 years they grew into hundreds in my mind. Nine words that motivated me to stick to my dreams. My point? Even the least bit of praise can be powerfully motivating. So, don't keep it in – use your power!

## ON THE FAIRWAY, NEW LESSONS IN SAVING WATER

Note: The following article that appeared in the August 6, 2009 edition of the New York Times provides a look at how golf courses manage water and the expertise of the golf course superintendent. It is the second time the New York Times has referenced GCSAA, its members and/or the Environmental Institute for Golf in the past four months. The article is the result of a collaborative effort of GCSAA, the Institute, GCSAA members and industry officials. The impetus came from a news release regarding the GCSAA Golf Course Environmental Profile water survey.

Six years ago, when Georgia's state government rewrote its rules for water use during droughts, it cut no slack for an obvious culprit: golf courses.

With emerald fairways that glistened even in the most blistering conditions, they were a tempting target.

Yet golf course managers were indignant. They argued that they were reining in water use in dozens of ways, like planting native grasses and auditing sprinkler spray patterns. Instead of being penalized, they said, they should be emulated.

It took a while, but from the South to the arid West, their wish is coming true. Mindful that global warming could provoke more and longer dry spells, state governments are increasingly consulting golf courses on water strategies.

In Georgia, golf course managers have emerged as go-to gurus on water conservation for both industries and nonprofit groups.

Marriott International is applying lessons learned at its golf course here to its resort properties in other states. Habitat for Humanity is landscaping front yards with drought-tolerant plants recommended by golf superintendents.

"Look, if you want to learn how to irrigate, these are the guys to ask," said Garith Grinnell, who recently retired from the Southern Nevada Water Authority.

Such accolades are a turnabout for a business that is often faulted for harming the environment through excess use of water and pesticides.

In Georgia, the shift in perspective came about largely because of a crippling drought that peaked in 2007. By that year, 97 percent of the clubs that belonged to the Georgia Golf Course Superintendents Association had voluntarily adopted what are viewed as best-management practices for water use, reducing consumption, they estimated, by 25 percent in just three years.

Lake Lanier, Atlanta's main source of water, had meanwhile dropped to record low levels, exposing muddy bottom not seen in half a century. It dawned on state and local water managers that golf courses might have some useful know-how.

Golfing grounds managers "are great technical assistance to me," said Kathy Nguyen, president of the Georgia Water Wise Council, a state association of water professionals that encourages conservation. "I can call them up and talk to them about different technologies." (Georgia's drought eased significantly this year.)

Ms. Nguyen has relied on golf superintendents in drafting guidelines for homeowners like letting grass grow longer, fixing leaks in hoses as promptly as possible and keeping lawn mower blades razor sharp. (Grass cut by duller blades is more frayed and requires more water to stay healthy.)

The golf industry still draws strong criticism from environmentalists. Turf is, after all, the thirstiest of plants. The average American golf course drinks up some 50 million gallons of water a year — comparable to the yearly usage of 1,400 people. In the West, the figures are higher.

Yet that reality, coupled with rising water prices, is what led to strides like irrigating golf courses with "gray water," or nonindustrial wastewater that is recycled for other purposes.

Tom Bancroft, chief scientist with the National Audubon Society, says that for all the progress golf has made, it remains a deeply problematic industry. Many courses "use fertilizers that can run off into fresh water, and many use pesticides in lawn and grass," Mr. Bancroft said. (Audubon International, a separate group, works with golf courses to encourage wildlife preservation.)

Mark Esoda, superintendent of the Atlanta Country Club in suburban Marietta, where initiation fees are \$85,000, acknowledges that practices among the nation's courses range from indifferent to conscientious. But Mr. Esoda maintains that he and other superintendents have a lot to teach municipalities about watering their ball fields and homeowners about tending to their yards.

Zipping around the course on pine-shaded paths, Mr. Esoda stopped abruptly near the seventh hole. He gestured toward a patch of newly laid turf of zoysia, a warm-weather shade grass native to Southeast Asia and Australia. On shady parts of the course it is replacing fescue, a genus of cold-weather shade grass that can live through the winter and thus requires five months' more watering and mowing.

Mr. Esoda said he had also installed affordable monitors that prevent automatic sprinklers from activating during or right after a rain.

And when isolated dry spots appear on the greens, he said, he sends staff members out with watering cans rather than turning on the sprinkler system.

Finally, Mr. Esoda has made an aesthetic adjustment after years of savoring the green glow of a perfect lawn. "Crispy around the edges is O.K.," he confided.

Water is just one area where golf courses and environmentalists may find a rapprochement, said Anthony L. Williams, director of grounds at Marriott's Stone Mountain public courses just outside Atlanta.

As metropolitan areas sprawl outward, golf courses may be the only large-scale green space for miles around, offering crucial potential habitat for migrating birds and other wildlife.

Mr. Williams, who has a degree in local horticulture, has been letting native grasses take over his lawns. Off the fairways he does not even bother to mow, and on the greens he is maintaining grass at one-sixteenth of an inch higher than typical courses. It makes playing slow, he allows, but "consistent." He has also replaced all the flowering annuals with perennials, which generally require less water, choosing those that are attractive to native wildlife.

Since he took charge of the two courses in 2005, Mr. Williams has cut water consumption by 45 percent, he said, and witnessed the return of some wildlife species like the red-tailed hawk.

The changes have come with a price, like the occasional large brown spot on the fairway. But Mr. Williams says the golfers do not mind.

"I just stand out there on the greens and explain, 'We are doing this so your grandchildren can come out here and play,' "he said. "People understand that."

Here is a story that came our way via an employee of the golf shop. This is Zac Livingston.



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

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## It's Worth It to Me!

The HAGCSA Board of Directors has been studying our association's cash flow and has determined that a dues increase is necessary if we are to maintain our current level of operation. No one is really sure when we last had to make an adjustment. It has been at least 10 years.

In that time we have grown and modernized as an effective chapter. We have hired a professional association management company (SWA) to handle all of our back office responsibilities. They do the invoicing, collect the money and spearhead much of the coordination of our many functions. They keep the books. They publish the *Heartbeat*. They maintain and update our website. They take the minutes at every meeting. They insure that we don't make too many boneheaded errors. I did a little research. According to the US Bureau of Labor Statistics, \$100.00 in 1999 has the same buying power as \$129.47 now.
