



Course Profile: Mission Hills Country Club was established in 1914 and the golf course was originally designed by Tom Bendelow. The club as well as the golf course has experienced several mild renovations. Perhaps the most interesting is that the clubhouse was originally located east of Stateline Road, known today as the Carriage Club. In 2004 the club retained Keith Foster, Golf Course Architect, to develop a master plan for a major renovation of the course. In May 2006 the golf course was closed to construct/install new greens, tees, fairways, bunkers, irrigation system, drainage, cart paths, cart bridges and creek bank stabilization. The newly renovated course opened June 30, 2007.

On My Honor

With the morning mist still on the Hudson River, and the sun just kissing the cliff tops of the New Jersey Palisade, Aaron Burr, Vice President of the United States shot and killed former Secretary of the Treasury, Alexander Hamilton. Political opponents for years, the duelists faced each other after Burr sent these words to Hamilton, "Political opposition can never absolve gentleman from the necessity of a rigid adherence to the laws of honor."

Once upon a time people were motivated by honor. Acquiring it, maintaining it, defending it. Bitter duels were fought in its name. I don't hear much talk about honor anymore.

Could it be the concept of honor is too difficult to understand? Is it truly ineffable - impossible to define - to the point that no one really knows what it means? As a virtue, it has certainly taken a beating when some cultures identify the murder of family members as an "honor killing" and when criminals such as the Mafia call themselves "men of honor."

I looked it up in the Webster Dictionary and found the words "reputation" and "integrity." But, honor seems to be more than that. It is similar to the definition of character which is, "What you do when no one is watching." Again, it must be more than that. So, I researched what some historical figures said about it. Most of them described honor by what it is not.

Thomas Jefferson said, "Nobody can acquire honor by doing what is wrong." Ok, we'll assume he means you must do what is right or good. The problem may be that by today's standards those are up for debate.

The ancient Greek playwright, Sophocles, also tells us what not to do, but at the same time defines what is wrong, "Rather fail with honor than succeed by fraud."

Which reminds me of my favorite quote from The Kite Runner by Khaled Hosseini, "There is only one sin, only one. And that is theft. Every other sin is a variation of theft ... When you kill a man, you steal a life. You steal his wife's right to a husband, rob his children of a father. When you tell a lie, you steal someone's right to the truth. When you cheat, you steal the right to fairness."

Of course fraud is theft and any way in which someone defrauds another is wrong. Today, however, I feel as if fraud is the new coin of the realm. That it has become an accepted part of our culture. I hear so many conflicting claims from government officials – whether it is about global warming or the cause of terrrorism or

how to repair the economy - that sometimes I don't really know what to believe. It reminds me of a bit of graffiti I saw years ago, "Believe nothing of which you hear and only half of what you see."

I also like this observation by former U.S. President Herbery Hoover, "When there is a lack of honor in government, the morals of the whole people are poisoned." In other words, if we feel like our government is cheating us, then a kind of a tricle-

down corruption starts to exist.



Others say that honor is something that we are born with, and that we must strive to keep it. German philosopher Arthur Scholenhauer said, "Honor was not to be won, it must only not be lost." Here is a similar statement by French author and poet Nicholas Boileau, "Honor is like an island, rugged and without shores and once we have left it we can never return." Still, neither tells what it is.

And, you can't really claim to have it, as Ralph Waldo Emerson notes, "The louder he talked of his honor, the faster we counted our spoons." Could it be something that only other people can observe in you?

Leonardo da Vinci, endeavored to define it as, "He who sows virtue reaps honor." One of the best definitions I found is from journalist, Walter Lippmann, "He has honor if he holds himself to an ideal of conduct though it is inconvenient, unprofitable, or dangerous to do so."

I recall my father teaching me about honor and duty, and I have endeavored to teach my sons about it as well. I hope they will grow up in a world where honor has a resurgence and people are motivated by it once again.

Can Zoysiagrass Really Spring Back?

Recently, during spring course visits, the obvious signs of cart traffic were evident on zoysiagrass fairways, especially when comparing those that receive moderate to heavy golf cart traffic throughout the winter to those that do not. In most cases, it is too early to determine the degree of winterkill or the square footage (and in some cases the acreage) that will require sodding, as the zoysiagrass has yet to fully emerge from winter dormancy. And, while zoysiagrass sod is not currently being purchased in large quantities, sod producers are fielding calls from turf managers ensuring its availability, if and when needed.

Winter cart traffic on zoysiagrass fairways is a growing concern among experienced turf managers who have witnessed severe winterkill and are worried that a potential disaster looms in the future should the upper Transition Zone experience a severe winter in the coming years. Given the absence of significant turf loss in recent years, golfers and turf managers alike have forgotten the potential for winterkill damage on warm-season turfgrasses in this region. Additionally, the younger among us may simply not have experienced a winter in which severe winterkill damage has occurred. Even golf facilities have relaxed winter cart use restrictions over time. Despite this current trend, relaxing the standards on cart use when zoysiagrass is dormant is risky.


The abbreviated growing seasons for zoysiagrass during the last two years have actually further contributed to the potential for severe winterkill in the upper Transition Zone. More specifically, recent summers have been much cooler than normal and have combined with greater than average rainfall. The overcast skies when added to the cool and wet soil conditions have further hampered zoysiagrass growth and thus, there really has not been a full season of active growth or recovery.

With low mowing heights being maintained late into the golfing season, zoysiagrass is also not as durable. A lack of leaf tissue disrupts necessary carbohydrate storage and hardening off that are key plant functions during fall, thereby leaving the zoysiagrass in a vulnerable state, as it enters winter.

Below are some of the risks and side effects of winter cart traffic on zoysiagrass fairways. These may largely be applied to bermudagrass as well.

• **Slow Spring Greenup** – Zoysiagrass exhibits excellent wear tolerance, but not when it is dormant and unable to recover through growth. As such, the effects of winter traffic accumulate, and this results in a less than durable stand of turf that is very slow to green-up in the spring.

• **Soil Compaction** – Oftentimes soils are not completely frozen during winter play, thus leading to wet soils that are easily compacted. Root systems are sacrificed and poor turf health follows.



- **Weed Contamination** Thin areas or wear patterns often develop in high traffic areas and voids in the zoy-siagrass are quickly established with winter weeds or resident bermudagrass populations. Winter weeds are fairly easy to control, but bermudagrass contamination in zoysiagrass can be a major, if not expensive, problem.
- Large patch (Zoysia Patch) Damage from this turfgrass disease often lingers for weeks and months where zoysiagrass, weakened and stunted from winter cart traffic, is very slow to recover and unable to grow given the damage.
- **Weakened Turf** The biggest pitfalls of winter cart traffic are the season-long weakened state of zoysiagrass and the increased potential for future turf loss.

As more and more golf facilities open up their fairways to winter cart traffic, those that do not face increasing pressure and criticism from golfers to do so. Unless this trend is reversed, it is truly just a matter of time before we learn the lesson....once again....the hard way, as basic plant physiology and agronomics have not conquered all that the environment can dish out.
