## 2013 MO Cup Challenge

There is still time and room for you to join us at the 2013 MO Cup Challenge event. Registrations are filling up, but we can make room for several more of you, if you inquire today. The event will be a two-day scramble with added events and a change in the golf course rotation. The dates are September 30<sup>th</sup> and October 1<sup>st</sup>. The golf courses will be The Club at Old Kinderhook and Deer Chase GC. On day one we will be playing Old Kinderhook followed up by a two person alternate shot shootout on the Par 5 - 18<sup>th</sup>.

The shootout will be open to all participants and it will be a blind draw for your partner. The day of the tournament you will be asked if you wish to participate and given an entry slip. You will then put your slip in the below 12 handicap or the above 12 handicap box (honor system folks). We will draw one name from each box and that will comprise your team. The shootout will take place on 18 with a twist or two thrown in. Each round we will eliminate a certain number of teams until we are down to two. Tie breakers to determine teams to move on will be a closest to the hole chip off. The final two teams will play from the 18 tee.

#### Day 2 - Oct. 1st

Day 2 will be at Deer Chase GC, approximately 15 minutes east of Old Kinderhook. We played this course several years ago and it is a great scramble golf course.

## **How Did I Get Here?**

There comes a point in every golf course maintenance person's life where they ask themselves, "How did I get here?" For me this usually occurs mid August to Early September; hands callused from dragging the 100 ft green python; farmer's tan ripe and ready for the wife to loathe; brain fried from trying to decipher the complex interaction between the sun, water, turf, and other stuff; no young bodies left to do the "heavy lifting"......back to school they went; course details slipping away as you pick the best way to keep it together. A list grows, but first you must make it through the summer. All your hard work seemingly goes unnoticed until it rains. Then comes the disease. In these moments, you must dig deep, and ask, "How did I get here?"

For me it started way before I was born. It was in the 1930s when my Grandfather, Dr. John Alan Bradbury, was a caddy at Hillcrest Country Club in Coffeyville, KS. This Perry Maxwell designed golf course was my grandfather's childhood playground before WWII. Although his dad was a member and he could have played most every day, he chose the work hard play hard route dragging heavy bags across those old fairways for a buck a loop. When he could not get on a bag, he and his mates would find themselves on their knees, cutting crabgrass out of greens. Using the string line and grid method, he could make 25 cents an hour harvesting *Digitaria ischaemum*.

His stories are numerous. Whimsical ones: There was the time he and his buddies were playing golf and at the time there was not an outhouse or portable restroom available to use, but a lad in his group had to go. So he ducked back into the woods and did his business, only to come to the painful realization that he had used poison ivy as his organic Quilted Northern. Ouch. Coming of age stories like the times he and his buddies got up the gusto to go to the local bootlegger who just happened to be situated on the 5th fairway to secure a bottle of wine. Stories about a gentleman my grandfather caddied for who used to run a ball through a hole in his pocket and down inside his pant leg when searching for lost balls in the rough, "Oh here it is!" Most of all, he remembers the days sitting under a big tree, playing cards with his caddy friends, drinking a cold milk straight from the dairy farm across the street from the club. A dynamic playground it was indeed.

The onset and participation in World War II and later establishing a family and successful Veterinary practice, my grandfather's relationship with the game of golf screeched to a halt until 1966, when he joined Topeka Country Club. Another Perry Maxwell gem, these monstrous tree lined fairways and wickedly pitched greens would end up being his "Worlds of Fun." He took the game back up and slowly he approached retirement. He again established similar bonds as those of his childhood caddy days with his regular groups of golfers.

He bought my grandmother, Rosemary, clubs in 1974. She became hooked and was a constant threat in the ladies league at T.C.C. for years to come. Sometime in the early 80s, at about the age of 3, they began to stick a cut down nine iron in my hands. Wiffle balls were used at first, and then there was the day I switched to a real ball and pulled it through their living room window. A bond and connection had been established, I was hooked too. He and my grandmother encouraged me to play their favorite game all throughout my childhood, just as he had done more than half a century before me.

Still this doesn't totally connect the big question, "How did I get here"? But you must understand he was not the greatest golfer. Actually only once did he have an opportunity to shoot his age around 80, "I added my score up on the eighteenth tee and then proceeded to slice it in to the woods," he told me in an interview. He never used a PING or Calloway clubs, preferring his Jerry Barber Shankless irons and Bullseye putter. Man those sticks were weird looking. Yet these slim hozzled clubs suited his lightening quick backswing and jabby through stroke, a picture of beauty when he kept his head down. Score and friendship were priorities, but often he seemed more interested in the changes in the trees or signs of the local wildlife. He was a fixer of ball marks, a hater of practice swings, divots, and poor rake jobs. Also ladies day.

He was into golf for the intensity of the game and socialization, but like most in our industry, he was curious and perceptive about his surroundings, generally interested in the golf course, environment, and hard work it took to maintain his oasis. Quickly he established a relationship with T.C.C Superintendent, Leo Pellant. Perhaps originally to help quench his other addiction: FIREWOOD. Besides golf, my grandfather loved nothing more than to saw up some wood and start a grand fire in his fireplace. Leo would give him the scraps at first, but towards these later years when tree clearing became more prevalent, a load of uncut wood would sometimes be delivered to his driveway. A weekly trip to the maintenance shop was not

uncommon for Doctor Bradbury, as the crew called him. I believe he felt more at home there than in the stuffy men's locker room. So now, his influence on my path becomes more apparent.

Only lately have I begun to really piece together his influence and its motivation on my career. After almost 8 decades of being around the game he loved, some recent health issues caused him to retire at the age of 91. Tears in his eyes and a heavy heart, he gave up his golfing membership. It was a sad day cleaning out his locker. It has not been easy. The golf course, Topeka Country Club, was a true passion. And as he leaves the game, we lose a man that has the upmost respect for the plight of the "greenskeeper"; more than any other civilian I have ever met. Just that notion helps motivate me to get through the tougher days, knowing that a golf course can be so important to another human. It also explains how I got here. Just as my golf related career started before I was born, his golfing life will continue on through me.



## **Eligibility and Qualifications**

#### **Assistant Superintendent of the Year**

This award will be presented annually to the assistant who has demonstrated dedication and excellence at their job over the past year.

The guidelines are as follows:

- 1. Must be a member of the Heart of America.
- 2. Must be an assistant that represents their profession to the highest degree.
- 3. Must be at their present course for no less than two seasons.
- 4. This award shall be governed by the assistant's achievements in any of the following.
  - Competency in agronomic skills
  - Ability to efficiently run the daily operations of the course
  - Effectively running course projects
  - Assisting in the preparation of their course for regional or national events
  - Involvement with local, regional, or national turf related associations
  - Strong involvement in course renovations and new course construction
  - Goal oriented and striving to become a superintendent
  - Exceptional contributions to this association through involvement
- 5. These accomplishments must have occurred in the current year.

#### **Superintendent of the Year**

This award, established in 1970, has been presented annually to the golf course superintendent who has demonstrated dedication and outstanding service to his or her profession.

The guidelines are as follows:

- 1. Must be a "Class A or Superintendent Member" in good standing.
- 2. Must be a superintendent that represents the organization and himself to the highest degree.
- 3. This award shall be governed by the superintendents achievements in either:
  - Excellence in golf course management
  - Preparation of his or her course for regional or national golf tournaments
  - Achievements for renovation or new golf course construction
  - Involvement with local, regional, or national turf related associations
  - Exceptional contributions to this association through involvement
- 4. These accomplishments must have occurred in the current year.

#### Chester H. Mendenhall Award

This award has been established to honor an individual who has devoted extensive time and effort to the promotion of golf, the art of greens-keeping and other related fields. Begun in 1983, this award is named after a golf course superintendent who dedicated his life to his profession.

The guidelines are as follows:

- 1. Must be a HAGCSA member in good standing.
- 2. Must be an individual that represents the organization and him or herself to the highest degree.
- 3. This award shall be governed by the individual's achievements over an extended period of time:
  - Outstanding service to this organization
  - Involvement with local, regional, or national turf related organizations
  - Continued support and service to the golf industry or his/her community
